Rob Curtiss recently entertained members with an illustrated talk about Thomas Hardy (1840-1928) who led a literary life writing a huge number of poems and novels. Grandmother Mary, Mother Jemima and Teacher Mrs. Martin all encouraged him.

The young Thomas played violin at family gigs, producing lively sections in novels where country yokels played jolly tunes. He studied to be an architect, mainly in regard to churches, in Dorchester and further afield. In Cornwall he met and married Emma. Hardy went through a phase when Napoleonic matters interested him, reflected in Trumpet Major, and a stay in Wimbourne in 1881 inspired the Mayor of Casterbridge. The Woodlands and Tess of the Durbervilles followed, which had

a mixed reception. His dark and depressing novel *Jude The Obscure* was severely criticised.

Hardy liked the ladies and three of them figured strongly in his life. Florence Henniker he met in young days and, after Emma died, he married the young Florence Dugdale who adored and cared for him in his old age despite his depression.

When he died of a heart attack in 1928 his wish to have his heart buried in Stinsford was respected, but his cremated remains were buried in the Poets

Now a statue in Dorchester and a "Whistler" window in Stinsford Church pay tribute to him.
